The Grey Area



Place: Northwest Motorcycle Instructional School, Renton, Washington State, USA.

Date: Summer 2003.

Mission: Take part in 40-hour law enforcement motorcycle operators training course.

After almost three decades of riding bikes I was of the opinion that I knew how to ride, that was until I attended the Northwest Motorcycle school, in Seattle. Run by Zsolt Dornay and Craig Sjolin. Zsolt is a retired police officer of 27 years, 11 of those spent as a motor officer, has acquired quite a record of achievements in law enforcement and in the art of police motorcycle instruction. Craig, a Police Officer of 9 years and a Motor Officer for the past 5, is also a certified Police Motorcycle instructor for Washington State. But more importantly, not only are they excellent teachers and riders, but a great couple of guys. Constructive criticism interlaced with humour, patience and encouragement. And that

made the four days spent on the course pass way to fast.

There were eight of us on this particular course, six Americans and two Brits. It was pre-arranged that we would all meet up at the local fire station on the Sunday evening prior to starting the actual course. This would allow everybody a chance to introduce themselves and for Zsolt and Craig too give us some idea on what would be in store for us over the next week. Also, the need to sign a few waivers was called for, apparently it's

not that uncommon for the occasional broken bone or other injury to be acquired on the course. It was therefore reassuring to know that not five minutes down the road from the actual course site was the local medical centre.

After the introductions were over it was down to the important stuff. Safety, safety and safety were the key words and it was also back to basics. Always cover the clutch. Get on and off the bike via the high side. Use all fingers on the levers. Always wear a helmet, gloves and eye protection and most importantly, no fooling around. Plus a multitude of other do's and don'ts. All that taken care of we were told to report for class at 9am the following day.

There they were, all lined up in the morning sunshine, 12 Kawasaki Police 1000s. Zsolt told us that it was "pretty much guaranteed that we would all be dropping these bikes at some point" and he wasn't wrong. If these ex-police bikes had hoped for a nice quite retirement, then they must have been severely disappointed. Apart from the occasional dropping, it was the clutches that had the hardest time, the constant feathering of the throttle and clutch, that "Grey area". It's that area where the clutch is just biting and no more, keeping the engine around the 2000rpm mark and feathering the clutch you can do amazing things with a bike. That was our first lesson, find the "Grey area". With the front wheel up against a piece of 4x2 to hold the bike back we got the feel of what we were supposed to be looking for. Equipped with that knowledge we were taken through a range of exercises that would improve our riding ability ten fold. There were approximately twelve exercises that had to be mastered over the week, ranging from an 18ft enclosed circle called the 'Key Hole' to the 'Kink Alley', this one pattern incorporated high speed braking, lock to lock turns causing 180-degree changes in direction and slow speed weaving. Then there was the '40 Decel'. Achieve 40mph then break to a complete stop within 80 feet without locking-up either brake, trying not to run into the cones at the end, then enter a "L" shaped pattern to exit slowly. Forty doesn't sound that fast but 80 feet can pass pretty quickly when you're trying to stop in a hurry.

At the end of the week it's time to put all that hard work into practice and get that 'Certificate of Achievement in the art of Law Enforcement Motorcycle Riding'. To qualify for the certificate we are given two minutes to complete a course that involved every exercise that we had learnt. Craig showed us how it should be done using his Harley Davidson Police Road King. The Harley has a wider turning circle than the Kawasaki and as we were using Kawasaki's the cones were positioned for them. I don't think any of us had seen a bike ridden quite like that before, full lock to lock turns with footboards digging into

the asphalt. All done smoothly and precisely and under full control. Impressive is an understatement, but inspiring. Craig did the entire course in about one minute 30, it took us about one minute 45, but if you acquired penalties, which were foot down or knocking over a cone, 5 seconds added to your time and that could take you over the 2 minutes and then you get to do it all over again. If you ride out of a pattern or fall off, you can kiss that attempt good-bye too, and you had to do the whole thing



twice to get the certificate, once against the clock and the second just had to be a clear round. But just to keep you on your toes you only get six attempts to get it right, if you don't get the two clear rounds in the six, you have to start all over from the beginning, and the longer it takes, the harder it becomes. One cone can make all the difference.

One person who shall remain nameless, managed to qualify in just two goes, outstanding. Some of us took a little longer to qualify and some just had to call it a day and be sissified with the 'Certificate of Attendance'. But one thing is for sure, what Zsolt and Craig and all the other instructors who came along over the four days to help out had instilled in us was, 'Look where you want to go. Head and eye. Look, lock and lean. If you look down you're going down. Control of the clutch, throttle and brakes'. These basic rules will have a lasting affect on how we all ride in the future. As Zsolt said at the beginning, "when it all comes together, it really is J.F.M."





Greeves was founded in 1952. Most of their models were competition bikes which used Villiers engines and gearboxes together with a cast aluminum frame and their own design leading link front forks. They produced some models of road machines, the most notable of which was the 'Essex Twin' using a 2T twin cylinder Villiers engine. These were supplied to the City of London Police between 1964 - 1965. The model shown above is a Greeves 24DE, engine no PRO227/4450, frame no 24DE 101. It was the original prototype and was a single cylinder two stroke. The 24DE was only made for the Police service. It was presented by Greeves to Southend on Sea Police in March 1967. Other notable users were the City of London Police and Staffordshire Constabulary, UK.
